A strong sense of community continues to stand out to each of us. The support we continue to receive from our participants, the region, the City of Keene, our collaborators, area businesses, individuals, and volunteers strengthens our ability to serve the Collaborative's children and families.

Out-of-school and summer programs allow "our kids" to develop friendships, to establish relationships with mentors, aid in development of social and emotional skills, provide opportunities for leadership development and team-building skills, and boost self-confidence. Our children become more engaged in learning as their areas of interest are expanded. These all contribute to success in the classroom and, ultimately, success for the future.

Many within our community have shared personal stories with us about what made a difference in their lives as children, how involvement in activities created opportunities to learn about themselves and focus on areas of interest. In some cases, mentors and friends changed the path they took in the future.

Highlights from 2018 show we have more than 30 partnerships with community organizations offering quality programming for youth. Two hundred and forty-six children, approximately 50% of all children living in Keene Housing households, participated in activities through the Collaborative. At our third Annual Breakfast Fundraiser, nearly 100 supporters learned about opportunities provided through KHKC for area children living in affordable housing which benefit educational experiences and future outcomes.

We invite everyone in the community to join us in making a difference for children living in our region. We invite you to attend our 2019 Annual Breakfast in November and find ways to become involved.
